Uganda Youth Aid Nursery and Primary School Classrooms - August 2025

1. Executive Summary

Speakers for Africa, Inc. seeks donor support through its **Building Brighter Futures Uganda Program** to improve learning conditions for vulnerable children at Uganda Youth Aid Nursery and Primary School in Kampala. With more than **1,000 students—many orphans and children from low-income households**—the school faces unsafe classrooms, an unsafe and unhygienic kitchen, inadequate sanitation, lack of proper accommodation for students and teachers, and limited learning resources.

Our response is a **modular, phased approach**. Each phase can be sponsored and implemented independently while contributing to the school's long-term development. Donors can select the phase that aligns with their mission, priorities, and budget—with confidence their gift will complete a tangible, high-impact project.

2. Phases of Implementation and Budget Summary

Phase 1 – Kitchen Rehabilitation: \$1,485 (This project has been funded and is currently being completed.

Ensure safe, hygienic meal preparation and delivery.

Phase 2 – Classroom Floor Rehabilitation: \$4,488

Repair six classrooms to create safe, sanitary, durable learning spaces.

Phase 3 – WASH & Learning Materials: \$1,500

Install handwashing stations and provide essential learning resources.

Total Budget (Phases 1–3): \$7,473

While legally based in the U.S., programs are primarily **led and implemented by Ugandan staff on the ground**, ensuring projects reflect community priorities and true local ownership.

Founded by a mother—son team with 30+ years of lived experience in Uganda and supported by dedicated staff in both the U.S. and Uganda, the organization blends U.S.-based accountability with strong local leadership to deliver transparent, sustainable, community-driven projects.

- **Mission:** Identify and remove barriers to education for vulnerable children in Uganda.
- **Vision:** Every young student in Uganda should have access to safe, inclusive, quality education.

Administration Costs

Speakers for Africa operates a **lean administrative model** (core overhead privately covered), so donor contributions go directly to program delivery. All projects are executed **in compliance** with Ugandan government regulations and aligned with international and UN education goals.

5. Partnership with Uganda Youth Aid Nursery & Primary School

Location: Mbuya Parish, Nakawa Division, Kampala.

Enrollment: 1,000+ learners, many orphans, HIV/AIDS-affected, or from low-income

households.

Annual Admissions: Over 200 disadvantaged children.

Timeline of Support (2019–2025)

• **2019:** Donations of vegetable seeds to strengthen food security.

- **2020:** COVID-19 response—delivery of PPE, sanitizer, and essential supplies.
- 2021–2022: Scholastic support—books, supplies, seeds, and small farming tools.
- **2023:** Formal organizational commitment—learning instruments, meals, educational supplies.
- **2024:** Youth empowerment—launch of boys' and girls' soccer teams (jerseys, equipment, trained coaches).
- **2025:** Infrastructure investment—50 new desks delivered, lifting ~200 children off the floor into safe classrooms; expanded school feeding and hygiene education.

6. Problem Statement & Needs Assessment

Uganda Youth Aid NP School faces **severe infrastructure and welfare gaps** that undermine safe, quality education: unsafe and overcrowded classrooms with unfinished floors; an unhygienic kitchen; inadequate sanitation; lack of proper accommodation for students and teachers; limited learning materials; high student–teacher ratios; and food insecurity that leaves many students hungry and unable to concentrate.

Key Findings (Needs Assessment – August 2025)

- **Infrastructure Risks:** Unsafe kitchen, unfinished classroom floors, inadequate sanitation, unsafe temporary classrooms.
- Overcrowding: Insufficient space; high student–teacher ratios.
- Learning Constraints: Shortage of desks, books, and teaching aids.

- **Food Insecurity:** Hunger reduces attendance, concentration, and outcomes.
- Girls' Vulnerability: Lack of dormitories → long commutes and higher dropout risk.
- **Teacher Shortages:** Capacity below standards affects instruction quality.

Conclusion:

Without intervention, these deficiencies will continue to endanger student well-being and prevent the school from meeting basic education standards.

7. Recommendations

- **Kitchen Rehabilitation:** Safe, hygienic meal preparation.
- Classroom Upgrades: Replace unsafe structures; complete flooring.
- Sanitation Improvements: Handwashing stations, WASH signage, safe facilities.
- Girls' Dormitory Completion (Future Phase): Protect vulnerable learners.
- **Teacher Support:** Recruitment, training, accommodation.
- Learning Materials: Textbooks, ICT resources, teaching aids.
- **Nutrition Programs:** Strengthen daily feeding (prioritize HIV-positive learners).
- Compound Safety: Level grounds to reduce accidents.

8. Proposed Modular Project (Immediate Phases) Expanded

Phase 1 – Kitchen Rehabilitation (2 weeks | \$1,485)

- Cement flooring (144 sq ft, 2 in thickness)
- Wall patching and sealing
- Replacement of utensils and storage
- Skilled local labor and community participation

Phase 2 – Classroom Floor Rehabilitation (6 weeks | \$4,488)

• Rehabilitate six classrooms with durable cement floors

• Improve sanitation, air quality, and safety

Phase 3 – WASH & Learning Support (3 weeks | \$1,500)

- Handwashing facilities & soap
- Hygiene education materials
- Supplementary textbooks & scholastic resources

Total Budget (Phases 1–3): \$7,473

9. Expected Results, Impact, and Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E)

Outputs (Tangible Deliverables)

- 1 rehabilitated kitchen (floor, walls, utensils, hygienic storage)
- 6 rehabilitated classrooms (cement floors)
- WASH package: signage, two handwashing stations, soap, hygiene education

Outcomes (Sustainable Change)

- Improved student health, attendance, and nutrition
- Safer, more inclusive classrooms for 1,100 children
- Higher instructional quality for 30 teachers/administrators
- Increased equity for orphans and HIV/AIDS-affected learners

Monitoring & Evaluation Framework

- **Health & Attendance:** % reduction in absenteeism; # students served daily through rehabilitated kitchen (target: 1,100).
- **Infrastructure & Safety:** # of classrooms rehabilitated (target: 6); % compliance with KCCA standards.
- **Learning & Instruction:** Teacher satisfaction (baseline vs. endline); student comfort levels; attendance ratio improvement.
- **Equity & Inclusion:** Retention rates among vulnerable learners; gender-sensitive outcomes for girls.

Methods: Baseline & endline surveys, engineer inspections, school data, FGDs, photo/video documentation.

Frequency: Monthly tracking, quarterly reviews, final evaluation.

Accountability: Donor reports with receipts, photos, videos, and livestream check-ins.

Engineering & Technical Notes (Phase 1 – Kitchen)

- Floor: 12 ft \times 12 ft (144 sq ft / 13.4 m²), thickness 2 in (5 cm)
- Materials: ~50 bricks, 2 bags cement, 0.20 m³ sand (patching/sealing)
- Equipment: Large cooking pots, paddles, storage shelves, water containers
- Labor: Skilled local masons/builders; meals provided during work
- **Procurement:** Local sourcing to reduce transport cost and support ownership

Phased Project—Phases 2 and 3

- Phase 2: Classroom Floor Rehabilitation (6 weeks) \$4,488 (estimated BoQ pending final engineering review)
- Phase 3: Additional Sponsorships Sanitation/WASH improvements & learning materials (3 weeks) \$2,985 (estimated BoQ pending final engineering review)

Total Program Budget (Phases 1–3): \$7,473 (Note: Phase 2 and 3 are estimated budgets)

11. Sustainability Plan

- **Community Ownership:** Parents and leaders engaged in planning, monitoring, and maintenance.
- Government Alignment: Works aligned with KCCA and MoES standards.
- Local Procurement & Labor: Build capacity and ownership.
- **Income-Generating Initiatives:** School gardens and poultry to sustain feeding.

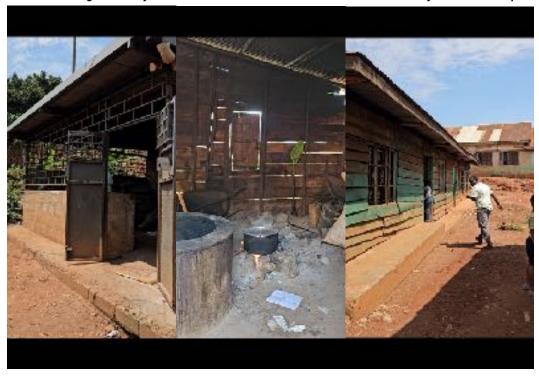
